(Cowes), took place on Tuesday, the first part of the service being at St. John's Church and the interment at Carisbrooke Cemetery, the Rev. F. J. Pitts officiating. The mourners were the widow, Mr. and Mrs. J. Burrow (parents), the Misses Laura, Ada, and Maude Burrow (sisters), Mr. and Mrs. R. Philpot (brother-in-law and sister), and Mr. and Mrs. Harris (father-in-law and mother-in-law). There also attended Messrs. H. L. Arter, S. Lovett, T.P. Adams, and R. Chambers (representing Messrs. J. S. White and Co.), Messrs. W. H. Thomas, R. H. Mason, C. A. Young, S. Charlton, W. Bevis, F. Arnold, A. Hounsell, and H. Waring, who were the bearer party, and other members of the head-office staff, Messrs. H. E. Plucknett (representing the Cowes branch of the National Union of Clerks, of which deceased was a member), W. Cushen, G. Jackman, H. Abraham, H. Morris, and A. C. Brown. Several of the staff from Parkhurst Prison also followed. The coffin was covered with a wealth of floral tributes sent by the directors of Messrs. J. S. White and Co.; Engr.-Capt. J. W. Ham, C.B., R.N.; his fellow clerks; N.U.C., Cowes branch; employees and staff of Somerton Works; Messrs. J. S. White and Co.'s employees at Devonport; Messrs, J. S. White and Co., East Cowes; the main office; the Cricket Club, Parkhurst; and the officers of Parkhurst Prison; in addition to relatives and others.
