DEATH AT NEWPORT A NOTABLE HUNTSMAN.

The Isle of Wight Hunt has this week lost by death one who for many years was the highly esteemed and popular kennel huntsman at Marvel. We refer to Mr. Martin Care, who succumbed to a long and painful illness on Monday. The deceased, who had well-nigh attained four-score years, was born in the North and was early in life associated with several of the best-known packs of fox-hounds in the northern counties. After hunting the Morpeth pack he was engaged in similar employ in Italy, but returned again and became huntsman to Sir Wilfred Lawson, Bart., M.P., in whose service he remained for many years, being held in warm regard by the well-known baronet. Deceased came to the Island in 1884 as kennel huntsman to the late Gen. Sir Henry Daly and served under Mr. John Harvey, by both of whom he was held in the highest esteem, as well as the present Master (Col. Howard-Brooke, J.P.) and members of the I.W. Hunt, who he has served so faithfully and well. In appearance and accomplishments he was a typical huntsman, his ripe experience was invaluable, and his cheery manner and other personal qualities contributed to his popularity. His death is much regretted by all associated with the Hunt. The funeral took place on Thursday at Carisbrooke Cemetery, the Rev. A.H.C. Edlin impressively officiating. In addition to the family mourners those present included Mr. C. Dashwood and Mr. James D. Jolliffe, representing the Hunt in the unavoidable absence of the Master and Mr. W.G. Young (hon. secretary), the former being absent from the Island and the latter laid up with a severe chill. The kennel staff was represented by Messrs. John Scovell and Walter Burgess. There were many beautiful floral souvenirs, including those inscribed "With all sympathy and every respect for an old and valued servant, from the members of the Isle of Wight Hunt," and "In memoriam, from John and Tom, fellow workmen."
