DEATH OF MR. CHARLES J. DASHWOOD

The death occurred on Saturday, at Glenfield, Carisbrooke, of Mr. Charles James Dashwood, aged 69, a member of an old and esteemed Island family, who was for many years prominent in Island public life, and in business and sports circles, and was possessed of many good qualities. The second son of Mr. J. J. Dashwood, of Ryde and Redway, he took over and rebuilt Waterman's Brewery, Trafalgar-road, Newport, and carried it on for many years as the Carisbrooke Brewery, until financial misfortune overtook it. He afterwards lived more or less in retirement at Harewood Lodge, Carisbrooke. For many years the deceased was an active member of the Newport Town Council, first as a councillor and afterwards as an alderman, and he was also one of the first borough members of the County Council. He was for a long time secretary of the Hunt and clerk of the course for the Island races at Ashey, in connection with which he did good work, and was also prominent for some years in connection with the point-to-point races. He manifested the greatest interest in sport, notably hunting. During the time when the late Prince Harry of Battenburg and the ex-Empress of Austria hunted with the Island foxhounds he was a regular rider to hounds, and his fine mount "Emperor" will be remembered by many. Mr. Dashwood took the leading part in promoting the well-deserved testimonial to Mr. Jim Jolliffe on his retirement from the position of huntsman of the Island foxhounds. During his retirement at Carisbrooke he took a keen interest in parochial matters, and was for many years the correspondent of the Church Infants' School. His wife died last year, and since that he had been in failing health. He sold Harewood Lodge, Carisbrooke, some months ago, and has since resided at Glenfield. His business methods were marked by painstaking care, not to say faddish punctiliousness, the office, yard, and works of the former Carisbrooke Brewery having been a model of neatness and tidiness. "A place for everything and everything in its place" was a motto, the observance of which he strictly insisted upon without regard to the time or labour spent in gratifying his idiosyncrasies in this and other respects. He was an authority on sport, and his recollections, which he was fond of imparting, of his hunting days with Royal, imperial, and other notable personages, were very interesting. In politics he was a Unionist.

The funeral took place on Tuesday at Carisbrooke Cemetery, Col. the Rev. G. H. Colbeck officiating. The personal mourners were Mr. Douglas R. Atkey (nephew), Mr. J. Pullen (nurse attendant), and Nurse Nutt. Others present included Major Henry J. Way, V.D., Messrs. Seymour Pittis, Richard Woodward, John T. Read, R. Bird Cheverton, J.P., J. Robinson (solicitor, Ryde), J. H. Heal, J. H. Greenfield, A. Peck, C.C., T.C., J. Lockhart, Edward Moore, W. J. Watts, and Robert Hookey, Mrs. J. H. Greenfield, Mrs. Robert Fisk, and Mr. and Mrs. G. H. Kemp. The body was enclosed in a teak coffin with inner shell, the brass plate bearing the inscription "Charles James Dashwood, died January 31st, 1920, aged 69 years". There were several beautiful floral tributes. Messrs. H. and F. Damp carried out the arrangements.
