NOTABLE TRADEMAN'S SUDDEN DEATH. – Mr. James Dyer, of Orchard-street, the well-known manufacturer for nearly 20 years of “churchwardens” and other clay pipes, was found dead in bed on Sunday morning by his wife. Deceased, who had been ailing for some time, as a mainland contemporary remarks, has “known nothing of the stress of competition in this particular line, as his has been the only business of the kind in the Isle of Wight. His enterprise was not limited by geographical insularity, as he had a rather extensive connection on the mainland in a business which is rarely met with nowadays.” The funeral took place on Tuesday afternoon, the Rev. A.J. Ball (Primitive Methodist) officiating at Carisbrooke Cemetery, the mourners including the widow, Mr. Ball (brother-in-law), Chief-Inspector Ayres and Mrs. Ayres (nephew and niece), and the employees of deceased. Deceased was 67.
