## Mr. Benjamin Jupe

### Hampshire Advertiser 14 June 1873

#### NEWPORT

Sudden Death – On Tuesday, about 11 a.m., Mr. Benjamin Jupe, aged 67, of Gunville, formerly cook at Parkhurst Prison, was ascending the steps of the Townhall for the purpose of appealing against the assessment of some property, when he was seized with illness, and fell dead. Mr. F. Blake, coroner, held an inquest at the Townhall on Tuesday evening on view of the body, when the following evidence was given: -- William Hayles, of Gunville, who had been a near neighbour to deceased 30 years, said deceased that morning, accompanied by a boy, drove to the hall in a pony cart and alighted. Witness helped him up the hall steps, and advised him to keep calm, as he had long complained of disease of the heart. Deceased stood on the landing, holding the rail, and appeared to be calm and not more sickly than usual of late. Witness left him for a minute to look into a room, then returned, and immediately deceased fell on his face. Witness, with assistance, raised him, and about a minute after falling he breathed his last. – Mrs. Ann Gannaway Sutton, deceased's daughter, said she was housekeeper to deceased at Prospect-place, Gunville. He had been ill and confined to his house for two months, but during the last three weeks had been able to get about. Dr. Dabbs had attended him and said that he had disease of the heart. She, knowing that he ascended steps with great difficulty, advised him not to go to the hall at Newport to appeal, but he refused to take her advice. He attained his 66<sup>th</sup> year in February last. – Dr. Waterworth, who was called in just as deceased expired, was of opinion that deceased died from disease of the heart. – Verdict, "Died by the visitation of God."
