NEWPORT.

SUDDEN DEATH. - On Saturday morning an inquest was held at Newport, before the Deputy-Coroner of the Island (Mr E.F. Blake), on the body of John Kimber, whose death took place with lamentable suddenness in St James's-square, on the previous Thursday. - William Kimber, living in Union-street, said his brother was a bricklayer, 47 years old, and lived with him. On Thursday afternoon they were in St James's-square, close to the Fountain inn. Deceased was standing three or four yards from witness, when he staggered towards him. Witness caught him, unfastened his shirt collar, and, with assistance, took him to Dr Castle's, but he died in about ten minutes after. Dr Castle was at home, as also was his son (Dr Hutton Castle). Deceased never spoke after he fainted. His health had been bad for some time. He had suffered from rheumatism and shortness of breath. Had not been able to do any work for four years. - Dr Henry Castle stated on Thursday the deceased was brought to his house. He was dying, gave a few gasps, and expired. At the coroner's request he made a *post-mortem* examination, and found that death was caused by apoplexy of the right lung, an uncommon form of disease, but not wholly unknown. - The jury returned a verdict of death from natural causes.

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
