#### NEWPORT.

**DISCHARGED SOLDIER'S DEATH.** – The death took place at the County Hospital on Saturday, from an internal complaint thought to have been contracted on active service, of Mr. Cecil Jack Leal, aged 25, third son of Mr. E. J. Leal, of 61 Carisbrooke-road, the foreman of the Corporation workmen. The deceased, a very highly respected young fellow, was a compositor in the employ of Messrs. W. Blake and Son. He joined the R.A.O.C. early in 1915 and later was transferred to the Machine Gun Corps. He served as a machine-gunner on the Western Front, and was twice severely wounded, being discharged from the Army about a year ago on accounts of wounds. He was a member of St. John's Men's Bible Class. Much sympathy is felt with Mr. and Mrs. Leal, whose eldest son was killed in 1915, whilst serving with the R.Es in France. The funeral took place at Carisbrooke Cemetery on Thursday.
