**Death of Mr. A. H. Lindsay.**- Much regret is felt at the death, at his residence, Penryn, Alvington-road, on Saturday of Mr. Arthur Henry Lindsay, a well known local builder, who was prominently connected with the Wayfarers' Fellowship. His death at the early age of 32 was the result of pneumonia, and much sympathy is felt with the widow and her two small children and other members of the family in their heavy bereavement. Mr. Lindsay was the elder son of Mr. and Mrs. W. H. Lindsay, of 67 Caesar's -road, Newport, and worked as a carpenter for Messrs. T. E. W. Phillips and W. Simmonds for some years before he commenced business on his own account two years ago. He was formerly a member of the Newport Corps of the Salvation Army and was a bandsman for some years. On coming to reside here he became one of the founders of the Wayfarers' Fellowship, which has been in existence just over a year. With others he raised the necessary funds to reopen the former Primitive Methodist Chapel on Alvington-hill for the meetings of the Fellowship, and was its esteemed secretary, displaying many admirable qualities in that office. The funeral took place on Wednesday, the service being held in the Chapel, which was filled to capacity. The large gathering included many business associates and representatives of the Wayfarers' Fellowship and Salvation Army. The service was conducted by Major and Mrs. Mace of the Newport Corps of the Salvation Army, and Mr. W. C. Cooper at the organ accompanied the singing of the hymns "Jesu, Lover of my soul," and "There is a Home eternal". The interment followed at the Cemetery. The chief mourners were the widow, Mr. W. H. Lindsay (father), Mr. F. Lindsay (brother), Mr. C. Holbrook (father-in-law), Messrs. E., B., C., and W. Holbrook and S. Jolliffe (brothers-in-law), Mesdames S. Jolliffe and E. Messrs. O. C. Hamilton and Son made the arrangements. A memorial service will be held in the Salvation Army Citadel tomorrow (Sunday) evening.
