R.A.M.C. Officer's Death.—The death took place, after a long and painful illness, at 71 Pyle-street, on Friday week, of Capt. Frederick William O'Conner, R.A.M.C., aged 64, who throughout the war was the popular and efficient quartermaster at the Military Hospital, Parkhurst. The deceased officer was held in the highest esteem by both officers and men of the units with which he had dealings in his official position, and there was a large gathering of military at the funeral, which took place with full honours at Carisbrooke Cemetery on Tuesday afternoon. A party of officers, including Lieut.-Col. H. S. Jervis (commanding the 2nd Royal Munster Fusiliers), acted as pall-bearers, and the full band, firing party, and a company of rank and file from the regiment attended, as well as representatives of the other units stationed locally. There were many beautiful floral tributes, including those from Col. Houghton and officers, and the W.Os, N.C.Os, and men of the R.A.M.C., Parkhurst. The Rev. Father Ahearn officiated.
