DEATH OF A SALVATIONISTS. – Much sympathy is felt for Bro. E. Rogers, treasurer of the local corps, who on Wednesday lost his step-daughter after an operation at the Royal County Hospital, following a painful illness. Sister Rogers was only 19 years of age and was a much-esteemed member of the Salvation Army. A special memorial service in connection with the funeral will be conducted by Brigadier Ewens at the local barracks to-morrow afternoon.

SALVATION ARMY FUNERAL. – The funeral of Miss Rogers, a much-esteemed young member of the local corps of the Salvation Army, whose death was referred to in last week's *County Press*, took place on Sunday afternoon last, being attended by a very large number of members of the Salvation Army and other sympathising friends. Prior to the interment at Carisbrooke Cemetery there was an impressive service at the Salvation Army Barracks in Lugley-street. Brigadier Ewens, of Southampton, conducted the service and gave a touching address, as also did the local officer (Adjt, Scott). Hymns were sung by Miss Scott and Mr. W. Rugg, and the band, which was augmented by members from Cowes, played sacred music. The band headed the long procession to the Cemetery, where Brigadier Ewens conducted the remainder of the solemn service, giving another short address. Adjt. Scott offered prayer, Mr. Rugg sang another hymn, and the band played more funeral music. There were many beautiful floral tokens. In the evening Brigadier Ewens conducted a largely-attended service at the Barracks, held in memory of the late Mrs. Cooper and Miss Rogers.
