**1857** the 3<sup>rd</sup> Bengal (European) Light Infantry became the 3<sup>rd</sup> Bengal Light Infantry. Then in 1862 the 107<sup>th</sup> Regiment of Foot (Bengal Light Infantry).

**George Lewellin Smith** married Jane Oglivie 19<sup>th</sup> January 1864. St Mary's, Selly Oak, Worcestershire.

The regiment left India in 1875 and were stationed at Parkhurst Barracks on the Isle of Wight.

MILITARY FUNERAL.-Yesterday (Friday) afternoon the remains on Major George Lewellin Smith, of the 107<sup>th</sup> Regiment, who died at Parkhurst Barracks on the morning of Wednesday, the 16<sup>th</sup> instant, were borne with due military honours to the grave in Carisbrooke Cemetery. The fine band of the 49<sup>th</sup> Regiment was in attendance, and played the dirges. Among the mourners were three relatives of the deceased and many of the officers and non-commissioned officers of the 49<sup>th</sup> Regiment. The Rev. Canon Beach, Chaplain to the Forces, and the Rev. Edward B. James, M.A., Vicar of Carisbrooke officiated. The funeral arrangements were entrusted to Mr. John Cheverton, of Pyle-street, Newport. Deceased, a widower, who was 41 years of age, became ill on the 19<sup>th</sup> inst., and rallied shortly before his death.

MILITARY FUNERAL.-On Friday afternoon Major George Lewellin Smith, of the 107<sup>th</sup> Regiment, was buried at Carisbrooke Cemetery with military honours. The firing party, consisting of about 250 men, fell in on the barrack parade-ground at half-past one o'clock; and shortly afterwards the procession, consisting of the hearse, containing the body of the deceased, followed by his horse led by a groom, a carriage in which three of the deceased's relatives, the officers of the 107<sup>th</sup> Regiment, and the officers of the 49<sup>th</sup> Regiment, and the officers of the 66<sup>th</sup> Depot, left the deceased's quarters, the united bands playing "The Dead March" in Saul. As the day was wet, the funeral procession, after

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leaving the barracks, marched at a quick pace until reaching Newport, when the weather improved. The cemetery was reached about three, and the cortege met at the inner gate by the Rev. E. B. James, the Vicar, and the chaplain of the  $107^{th}$  Regiment. The coffin, which was of polished oak, was here taken from the hearse and carried by six sergeants, Colonel Lockhart and the senior officers of the  $107^{th}$  acting as pall bearers. The funeral service was read by the Rev. E. B. James, assisted by the chaplain; but the service at the grave was read by the latter. The arrangements were under the direction of Major Harris, and the grounds were kept by several members of the county police, under the direction of Mr. Superintendent Horan.

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
