NEWPORT.

DEATH OF MR. FREDERICK WADMORE. – We regret to record the death, which took place rather unexpectedly on Monday morning after a short illness from chest and heart trouble, of Mr. Frederick Wadmore, of Rose Cottage, Union-street, at the age of 54. The deceased was a respected member of a well-know Island family, and had carried on business in Newport for many years as a tailor and outfitter. By his death St. John's Church has lost one who had been a valued member and devoted worker, particularly in the Sunday-school, where last year he concluded 25 years service, when he retired from the position of superintendent of the boys' school. A vocalist of considerable ability he was for many years a member of the St. John's choir, in which he rendered much-appreciated service, and he was formerly prominently identified with the musical life of the town. He was an ardent supporter of manly games and recreations. He was one of the founders of the Newport Rowing Club, which had in him a devoted hon. secretary for several years, and he received from that Club a testimonial in the form of an illuminated address on his retirement. He was also an enthusiastic cricketer, and in his younger days was an efficient exponent of the game. In recent years he had taken up bowls, and he was a keen and reliable player in connection with the Carisbrooke and Newport Conservative Bowling Clubs. He was formerly a poultry fancier of some note. The greatest sympathy is felt with the widow and her large family in their heavy bereavement. The funeral took place yesterday (Friday) afternoon. The first portion of the service was held at St. John's Church, and was conducted by the Rev. F. J. Pitts. There was a representative congregation, including many of the church workers in connection with St. John's. Psalm 90 was chanted, and the hymns sung were "On the Resurrection morning" and "Peace, perfect peace." While the congregation were assembling the organist (Mr. Alex S.L. Scadding) played "O rest in the Lord" and Tschalkowsky's Funeral March, while at the close of the service Chopin's "Marche Funebre" was impressively rendered. The interment took place at Carisbrooke Cemetery, the Rev. F.J. Pittis reading the committal sentences. The family mourners present were Messrs. J.F. and L. Wadmore (sons), the Misses C. and H. Wadmore (daughters), Miss K. Wadmore (sister), Mr. C. Cooper, and Dr. M.L.B. Coombs. Amongst others present were Mr. W. Statham (superintendent of the St. John's boys' Sunday-school), Mr. R.J. Eldridge (treasurer of the Sunday-school), Miss J. George (superintendent of the girls' Sunday-school), Miss Leighton (superintendent of the infants' Sunday-school), Messrs. John Roach and James Eldridge (churchwarden), Mr. and Mrs. Frederic Stratton, Mr. and Mrs. H.E. Stratton, Mrs. Bath, and Messrs. H. Scott, G.A. Brannon, T. Low, H. Pring, T.S. Buckler, and C.W. Greenshield. There were a number of beautiful floral tributes of affection and sympathy from: His sorrowing wife and children; Aunt Bessie and family; Cousin Minnie; Aunt Kate and Luty; Cecil; Ada and Harold; Mr. and Mrs. John Roach; Mr. H.
