### Hampshire Advertiser – 21 January 1871 NEWPORT.

SUDDEN DEATH. – On Wednesday Mr. F. Blake, coroner, held an inquest at the Crispin Inn, Carisbrooke-road, on view of the body of August Baxman, aged 35, labourer at the Cement Works of Messrs. Francis, at Dodnor. Charlotte Baxman said deceased was her husband. They had been married thirteen years. He had been working the last nine months at Dodnor. On Tuesday, after working what they called a day and a half, he came home at 10.30 p.m., supped more moderately than usual on coffee, bread, and cold meat, and soon after he went to bed and there smoked his pipe. She retired with him for the night, he ceased smoking, put out the light, and lay down to sleep. She had not long been in bed when she heard a strange rattle in his throat, and, on trying to rouse him, found that he had ceased to breathe. She called Mrs. Urry. Deceased was in the county police force about two years ago, and at that time, when put upon any extra duty, suffered much from pains about the heart, and he left the force of his own accord. Lately he had been troubled with a cough, but kept to his work and had no medical treatment. – Dr. Castle said disease of the heart was the probable cause of death. Extra labour would be calculated to bring about a fatal result. – Verdict “Died by visitation of God.”
