## **NEWPORT.**

THE FUNERAL – of Private A. Dore, of C Company, I.W.R.V., took place on Wednesday last with military honours. About 100 of the headquarter companies paraded at 2p.m., the officers present being Capt. Way, Lieuts. Pring and Pinnock, and Quartermaster Minns. The firing party, under Sergt. Attrill, and the remainder of the Volunteers proceeded to the residence of the deceased in Crocker-street, where the coffin was covered with the Union Jack. The cortège thence proceeded to St. Thomas's Church, the band playing the "Dead March in Saul." Canon Haigh read the funeral service both at the church and at the grave with great impressiveness. At the conclusion of the service, three rounds were fired over the grave, the muffled drums beating after each round. On leaving the cemetery, the men were marched to headquarters and dismissed. The funeral arrangements were conducted by Mr. Cheverton, of Pyle-street, and eight comrades of deceased were the bearers. Better known as "Alfy," the late Mr. Dore was a Volunteer of 17 years service, and was big drummer in the band up to the time of his last illness.
