## Newport

**FUNERAL OF MR. CHARLES DORE** — On Monday morning the mortal remains of Mr. Charles Dore were interred in the Newport Cemetery, amid signs of general mourning. In the rear of the coaches containing the relatives of the deceased, a large procession was formed, and this was thoroughly representative of Island Wesleyan Methodism. Arrived at the Chapel, Pyle-street - with which the deceased has been associated for more than fifty years - the first part of the burial service was conducted in a most impressive manner by Rev. J. Shearman. The form of the service was supplemented by a short address, bearing on the exemplary Christian life which the deceased had lived whilst maintaining an unbroken connection with the Church of his choice for a period approaching sixty years. As the congregation slowly filed out of the chapel the organist played the "Dead March" in Saul. Among the congregation and spectators gathered at the Cemetery there was a considerable number of the poor of the town, to whom the deceased was ever a generous benefactor. This tribute of esteem must have been noticeable to the most casual spectator. Among the mourners were the Rev. J. D. and Mrs Thomas, and the Rev. N. and Mrs. Kelynack, with their respective families, also Mr. H. M. Morris, &c. We must not omit to add that several of the deceased's former shop assistants, many of them middle-aged men, and in business on their own account at Newport, Cowes, and Ryde, were present to pay the last mark of respect to their venerable and esteemed master. The coffin, which was borne on an open car, was covered with choice floral wreaths, contributed by sorrowing relatives and friends. At the grave the Rev. J. Shearman officiated, and, the service completed, a hymn was sung, after which the benediction was pronounced. The coffin was of polished oak, and bore a brass plate, in shield form, showing the name, age, and date of death. Doubtless the feeling of many mourners present was in harmony with the simple touching tribute uttered by a bystander, he stood beside the cold and silent grave. "There's ne'er a man gone to heaven if he hasn't" - At the services held at the Wesleyan Chapel, on Sunday last, solemn reference was

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made to the somewhat sudden decease of Mr. Dore. And at the conclusion of the morning service the congregation remained seated whilst the "Dead March" was played. As showing the esteem in which the deceased was held by his brethren the pulpit was draped in black. - The Rev. Henry Smith, of Cowes, assisted in the first part of the service, which, as we have previously stated, was held at the chapel.
