NEWPORT

A PAINFULLY SUDDEN DEATH – occurred on Thursday night, that of Mr. William Guy, aged 51, wheelwright, of 6 Pyle-street, who, when returning home, was suddenly taken ill in East-street and expired before aid could be rendered. The deceased, who was married, but lived alone, had followed his usual occupation during the day until 5.30 p.m. and afterwards was at work in the house. At about 8.30 p.m. he visited his sister, Mrs. Emily Warder, at 17 Robinhood-street, where he had a cup of tea, and left to return home at about 9.30 p.m. A quarter of an hour later he was found lying in the road in East-street by Mr. Charles Norris, of 4 Pyle-street. P.C. Whillier and Dr. S. Foster were quickly on the scene, and Guy was carried to the doctor's surgery, where it was found that life was extinct. The facts have been reported to the Deputy Coroner (F.A. Joyce, Esq.).
