Corporation Workman's Sudden Death.—The death took place with tragic suddenness on Tuesday of Mr. Harry Hayter, aged 67, of No. 4 Florida-terrace, Hillside, who for some 17 years had been employed by the Corporation at the Sewage Disposal Works. Deceased was a most valued and conscientious workman, and a much esteemed member of the Salvation Army. The deepest sympathy is felt for the widow and family in their bereavement. An inquest was held on Wednesday at deceased's home by the Deputy Coroner (F.A. Joyce, Esq.). Mr. G. H. Arthur, C.C., was the foreman of the Jury. The widow said that her husband left home for work on the previous morning at 5.45 and returned to breakfast at 8.30. He wheeled home a cwt. of coal which he had bought at the Sewage Works, and after lifting the bag from the barrow sat down on a chair just inside the kitchen door, and without speaking immediately fell and died. Her husband had been in wonderfully good health, except that occasionally he felt faint, which sometimes lasted for half an hour, but he had never had to stay from work owing to that. He had not been medically attended for many years.—Dr. Rushworth said he went to see deceased about 9.15 a.m. and found him lying dead in the kitchen. On a post-mortem examination he found that the right side of deceased's heart was extensively dilated and the muscular walls degenerated. There was some arterial degeneration. Deceased must have been short of breath for a year or two judging by the condition of his heart. He attributed death to syncope, arising from the condition of the heart. The Jury returned a verdict accordingly. The Foreman said the Jury knew the Corporation had lost a very valued servant by Mr. Hayter's death. They deeply sympathised with Mrs. Hayter and her family in their sorrow. The Coroner said he was sure the widow and family highly appreciated the observations of the Foreman.
