A MAN who built his own grinder and developed a flourishing knife-sharpening business has died, aged 77.

Mr William Saunders — Fondly known to many as Billy the Grinder — died at St Mary's Hospital, Newport, on May 17, following a short illness.

Mr Saunders, of Bellmead Lane, Newport, was born to a family of Romanies in Micheldever, near Winchester, and spent much of his early life travelling and was educated at many places, including Lyndhurst School.

After leaving school, he became a stable lad in the Lyndhurst area.

He later worked for his uncle on a fairground for a few years, where he learned to drive.

Mr Saunders drove lorries for a living prior to the second world war, when he joined the RAF.

He served as an airman first class for two years, prior to a freak accident while in Southampton.

A bomb blast during an air-raid in the city left him with a fractured spine and he was discharged from the air-force as being fit for special duties only.

But soon found his feet as a lorry driver on American air bases.

After the war, he married, Pat, and in 1945 the pair came to the Island to work at a farm at Merstone.

Stints as a Southern Vectis bus driver and a lighthouse keeper at Calshott Spit followed.

Mr Saunders then went back to farm work, before getting his own lorry and running a scrap business.

He built his own grinder barrel and developed a successful business sharpening knives, scissors, shears and other implements.

He was also well-known for making and selling traditional clothes pegs, wreaths and wooden flowers.

Mr Saunders was a member of the Southern Vectis Social Club and had recently been featured on Meridian television.

He leaves his wife, Pat, children Michael, Kathy and Sue, five grandchildren, three great-grandchildren and his sister Dorrie.

The funeral service last Friday at St Paul's Church, Barton, was conducted by the Rev Peter Rowe.

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
