NEWPORT

MILITARY FUNERAL. – The mortal remains of Private Charles Urry of No. 2 (Newport) Company, were consigned to their last resting place on Wednesday morning, at the Newport Cemetery. The company assembled at the Armoury at half-past ten o'clock, and proceeded to the late residence of the deceased. There were upwards of 40 members of the Oddfellows Lodge, M.U., from their Lodge-room at the Star Inn. The procession being formed, headed by the firing party and the band of the Corps, followed by the coffin, mourners, Rifle Volunteers, mustering about 70, and the Oddfellows of the Lodge of which deceased was a zealous member. The coffin, borne by the brethren, proceeded down the High-street, the band playing "The Dead March in Saul," through St. Thomas's-square, and down Pyle-street to the Wesleyan Chapel, where the corpse was taken, and after this portion of the service had been performed, the procession was re-formed and proceeded down Pyle-street to the grave. The burial service was read by the Rev. Mr. Johns, and after the firing party had executed their duties, an impressive address was delivered by Br. Sutton, Secretary of the Lodge of Oddfellows. Upon this occasion there were upwards of 2,000 spectators present.
