Death of Mr. J. H. Warder.—The death at his residence 136 Pyle-street on Monday of Mr. James Henry Warder, aged 78, has removed a figure well known in business and agricultural circles. Mr. Warder was a successful dealer in livestock, chiefly pigs, in his early years, and was noted for his shrewd judgment. He farmed for a while at Watergate over 50 years ago, and later founded the well known haulage business which bears his name, commencing with horse transport. During the 1914-18 war he was the principal local Government haulage contractor, and at one time controlled a “pool” including all the available local mechanical transport (steam wagons, etc.), as well as horse-drawn vehicles. Later he became one of the first Island contractors to change to motor transport. Some 15 years ago he took up farming again at Marsh Farm, Newtown, going in for sheep on a fairly large scale and winning many prizes, notably at gilten markets with his fat lambs. Latterly he had lived in retirement, but remained active until very shortly before his death. He was a supporter of the Conservative cause, and was one of the original members of the Conservative Club. He leaves a widow and family of three sons and six daughters, with whom sympathy is felt. The funeral took place at St. Paul’s Church yesterday (Friday).
